PRIVATE research into new technologies must be increased to avoid total Australian dependence on Imports parliamentary . science watchdog warned yes terday.

The chairman of the Senate Standing Committee on Science and Environment, Senator Jessop, called on industry to increase its research and development effort.

In an address to the United Service Institution of South Australia in Adelaide, Senator Jessop (Lib, SA) said Australian industry had overlooked the basic aim of generating new products or processes calls for

of potential economic significance.

Senator Jessop said only 50 per cent of research and development carried out in manufacturing was under Australian control.

"The danger in this is that our dependence may become passive, resulting in an injudicious importing of technology and the eventual shut-down of the existing low level of re-search and development," he said.

Police also under fire

AMID rowdy scenes, Sydney City Council aldermen last night attacked "Ineffectual" police attempts to stamp out prostitution in Darlinghurst residential areas.

Protesting Darlinghurst residents in the public gallery produced placards, reading "Darlinghurst, paradise of pumps" and "We are sick of seeing prostitutes' privates in public places."

And the meeting was

disrupted by insults flung between A.L.P. and Civic Reform aldermen from the public gallery.

The row started when Civic Reform member, Alderman Brae Antcliffe. moved four motions calling for council, police, and State Government action against-prostitution.
